Child and Family Services Improvement and Innovation Act



One Hundred Twelfth Congress of the United States of America

AT THE FIRST SESSION

Begun and held at the City of Washington on Wednesday, the fifth day of January, two thousand and eleven

An Act

To amend part B of title IV of the Social Security Act to extend the child and family services program through fiscal year 2016, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

This Act may be cited as the "Child and Family Services Improvement and Innovation Act".

TITLE I—EXTENSION OF CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES PROGRAMS

SEC. 101. STEPHANIE TUBBS JONES CHILD WELFARE SERVICES PRO-GRAM.

(a) Extension of Program.—Section 425 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 625) is amended by striking "2007 through 2011" and inserting "2012 through 2016".

(b) MODIFICATION OF CERTAIN STATE PLAN REQUIREMENTS.—

(1) RESPONSE TO EMOTIONAL TRAUMA.—Section (422b\15\4\00e4A\00e4i)) of such Act (42 U.S.C. 622b\15\4\00e4A\00e4ii)) is amended by inserting ", including emotional trauma associated with a child's maltreatment and removal from home" before the semicolon.

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(2) PROCEDURES ON THE USE OF PSYCHOTROPIC MEDICATIONS.—Section 422(b)(15)(A)(v) of such Act (42 U.S.C. 622(b)(15)(A)(v)) is amended by inserting ", including protocols for the appropriate use and monitoring of psychotropic medications" before the semicolon.

(3) Description of activities to address developmental needs of very young children—Section 422(b) of such Act (42 U.S.C. 6991.); is amended—




Children age 3 and under make up a third of maltreatment victims

Infants and Toddlers are the Largest Group Entering Foster Care




Proportion of Foster Care Entries that are Infants and Toddlers (by State)




