
HOW DID WE GET HERE?




CHILD WELFARE HISTORY/POLICY

- We know what is best for every child that we encounter
- We define child abuse and know exactly how to identify it
- We know what healthy parenting looks like; and we have the formula for it
- It is our job to rescue children and keep them safe from their caregivers

EVOLUTIONARY VS. REVOLUTIONARY

Evolutionary

- Inevitable, expected, incremental
- Evolutionary change usually happens to ensure <u>survival</u> of the system
- Surface-level; one size fits all approaches
- Protect children, help their families

Revolutionary

- Profound, fundamental, transformational
- Complete overhaul and reconstruction; re-shaping and re-aligning strategic goals and mission
- Examining the root cause of the circumstance, adaptive approaches
- Ensure children have an uninterrupted sense of belonging, strengthen their families



- Children are not having their needs met, situation is persisting.
- Children in Foster care were not seeing doctors or therapists in a timely manner.
- Children were in foster care for years without an end date/permanency plan.
- Children are being re-traumatized by disrupting the bonds they have with their foster parents.

EVOLUTIONARY VS. REVOLUTIONARY

- Let's place the child in a different home (foster family) and send resources with that child.
- We need to expedite their services getting them to mental health care and medical care they need.
- If a child is in foster care for more than 15 months, we need to pursue termination of parental rights so the child can have permanency.
- Foster parents are being supporting in adopting children, many informed by bonding evaluations and timelines.

- We need a reinvestment into communities so that the well-being and safety of children can be facilitated by families and their community and not state sanctioned intervention.
- Foster care should not be the pathway for needed services for families. These services should be accessible and known barriers removed.
- 1/100 children will experience a parent losing their parental rights (Wildeman, 2020).
 Timelines should not dictate the legal separation of a parent from their child.
- Our system should value sacred relational ties and be intentional about re-establishing bonds between children and biological families.

Mindset – Who are you?

Segregationist

- Hierarchical Power
- These people...cannot be helped.
- We have the answers, and we must save them...from themselves.
- Punitive
- Blames

Permanently inferior

Assimilationist

- Negotiated Power
- These people...can be helped. (Rehabilitative)
- We can help them become more civilized and educated.
- Standards (historically informed by white heteronormative values) that need to be reached
- Saves

Temporarily inferior

Anti-racist

- Shared Power
- These people are...
 people. They are already
 civilized. They are
 inherently valuable.
- Focus on equity
- Adaptive
- <u>Liberates</u>

Never inferior

MOTIVATION VS. MOMENTUM

Motivation: Reason for someone to act/behave in a certain way; a general desire and willingness for someone to do something (Emotional)

- Proximity to Community
- Acknowledge responsibility and/or culpability
- Be vulnerable and open to accountability
- Re-education Yourself

Momentum: the driving force gained by the development of a process or course of an event. It is not a feeling or emotion, but an action

- Write your values in cement, strategies in sand
- Find/Build a Community
- Create new professional habits
- Measure the work/Seek
 Feedback
